

## Yurumein (Homeland)

Review: Virginia Kerns, Ph.D., Professor Emerita of Anthropology, College of William and Mary author of Women and the Ancestors: Black Carib Kinship and Ritual

"This moving documentary film, produced and directed by Andrea Leland, tells two compelling stories at once, about cultural survival and cultural memory. The first is the story of a near-genocidal campaign by the British against the indigenous Carib (Garífuna) people of St. Vincent in the late eighteenth century. This is embedded in a second narrative: the words of descendents in the twenty-first century, diverse voices from the Garífuna diaspora. The film follows these descendants as they recover cultural memory, and gather to celebrate their ancestry and survival as a people. Riveting footage of dance—including a performance by visiting members of the National Garífuna Folkloric Ballet of Honduras—shows the central place of music and dance in this cultural revival. Leland seamlessly interweaves the two stories with a rich tapestry of scenes from daily life in their Caribbean homeland, Yurumein, St. Vincent."
